Strawbridge School Partners With Community College of Baltimore County BCC students can now take courses for college credit

Readers of Keywords can perhaps appreciate this common occurrence: one of our residents identifies a potential job, only to learn that the position requires as prerequisites a year or more of experience and a college-level certification.

“Not knowing how to get over those hurdles can be very discouraging,” said Laurie Anne Spagnola, BCC’s new President. “Our kids are smart and capable. We want to see them get that first job offer just like any parent would.”

The new partnership with Community College of Baltimore County (CCBC) starting this fall will let Strawbridge School students choose from four focus areas to better prepare them for those first job applications. The continuing education options are obtaining a pet handling certification, a 90-hour day care certification, retail training, and clerical training.

Dr. Angela Chambers, Vice President of Education, was excited for this opportunity. “We work hard to ensure our students are ready for the future, and I am delighted that they’ll have these classes as another highlight on their resumes. It will also be a huge confidence booster for many who would never have thought they could handle a college-level class,” said Chambers.

In addition to classroom instruction, each student will be working a minimum of two hours a week at a related job site (supervised by a BCC staff member). At the end of their course, they will each complete a practicum to demonstrate what skills they learned.

Thirty-two students are anticipated to use this program during the coming school year.

Mental Health Clinic Enjoys Tremendous Program Growth

Staff are on pace for a record year

Fourteen years ago, a small group of clinicians opened their doors to the Pasadena community. Their goal was simple: help children and their families navigate difficult times in their lives regardless of their ability to pay.

“There has been a clear and growing demand for mental health services for youth and families in the Anne Arundel County area,” said Andrea Carroll, Director of BCC’s Outpatient Mental Health Clinic (OMHC). When she took the reins in January of 2012, the clinic served ninety clients. Just a year later, they reached their maximum capacity of 113 clients and had to begin referring new clients to other facilities.

“My hat is certainly off to Andrea and her entire team,” said BCC’s President, Laurie Anne Spagnola. “When I met them for the first time this summer I could see immediately why they have enjoyed this tremendous success. You cannot help but feel calm and at ease the second you walk through their clinic’s door.”

In July the OMHC welcomed Jamie Woods, LGSW, as their newest full-time therapist. Her addition brings the clinic’s capacity up to 150 clients.

Yet rest does not appear to be in the stars for Carroll and her team.

In 2013, the clinic took on 56 new individuals as clients. In the 2nd quarter of 2014 alone they have conducted 33 new client intakes - more than double their average.

“I am incredibly pleased we have been able to grow so much this year,” said Carroll. “My hope is to continue expanding our services to meet the needs of children and families in our community.”

The clinic serves as more than just a space to heal. Last fall the Board of Child Care Auxiliary helped create a Thanksgiving meal box for each family who requested one. Later, they opened a Christmas store for those using the clinic who otherwise could not have afforded to shop for presents that year. Enough presents were donated that the OMHC was able to open the store to all families serviced by the clinic. Some parents “shopped” for gifts to give their children, some families let the children choose their own gifts. Some children even took the opportunity to select gifts for those they care about.

The OMHC has nine current staff members: one director, three full-time child and family therapists, two part-time therapists, two administrative staff, and one part-time psychiatrist.

Eastern Shore Youth Participate in Summer Work Program

BCC had five youth participate in the Summer Youth Work Program through North Caroline High School. The youth began employment on July 7th and worked Monday - Thursday from 7:30am-3:30pm. Working together as a team they put classrooms back together, wiped down furniture, assembled shelving, swept floors, and participated in staff meetings. The youth attended three field trips: one to the Easton Church of God, one to Echo Hill Summer Camp, and one to the Job Corp Training Center. All three trips provided them with knowledge, job readiness, and employment preparation skills. The summer work program ended on August 1, 2014 with a luncheon and awards banquet. The program's job readiness coach was very positive about all five of the youth who participated and commented that the youth were focused, well-mannered, and prepared to work.
